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Grammar Check: Subordinate Clauses

**Independent clause** = subject + verb + complete thought

The monkey screamed.

**Dependent clause** = [redacted] + subject + verb [redacted] thought

- They are also called [redacted] clauses (because they start with a subordinate conjunction).
- They need to be [redacted] an independent clause. They [redacted] stand alone.

When he saw the lion, the monkey screamed.

- They can be found in the beginning, middle, or end of the sentence.

When he saw the lion, the monkey screamed.

Use a comma when it introduces the sentence!

\*NO comma if attached after the independent clause.

The monkey screamed when he saw the lion.

# Review: Crossover OER's

- Quotes around titles of newspaper articles → “Sorry for Not Being a Stereotype”
- Underline titles of books → Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian
- Evidence → You need to **introduce the quote**
  - Don't plop! “At three years old I was sorting.”
  - Avoid introducing quotes with “it states/it says”
    - For novels → Give **context and character**
      - **In the exposition**, **Junior** explains, “At three years old I was sorting.”
    - For articles → Give **author**
      - **Pyrillis** writes, “No wonder people are confused...”

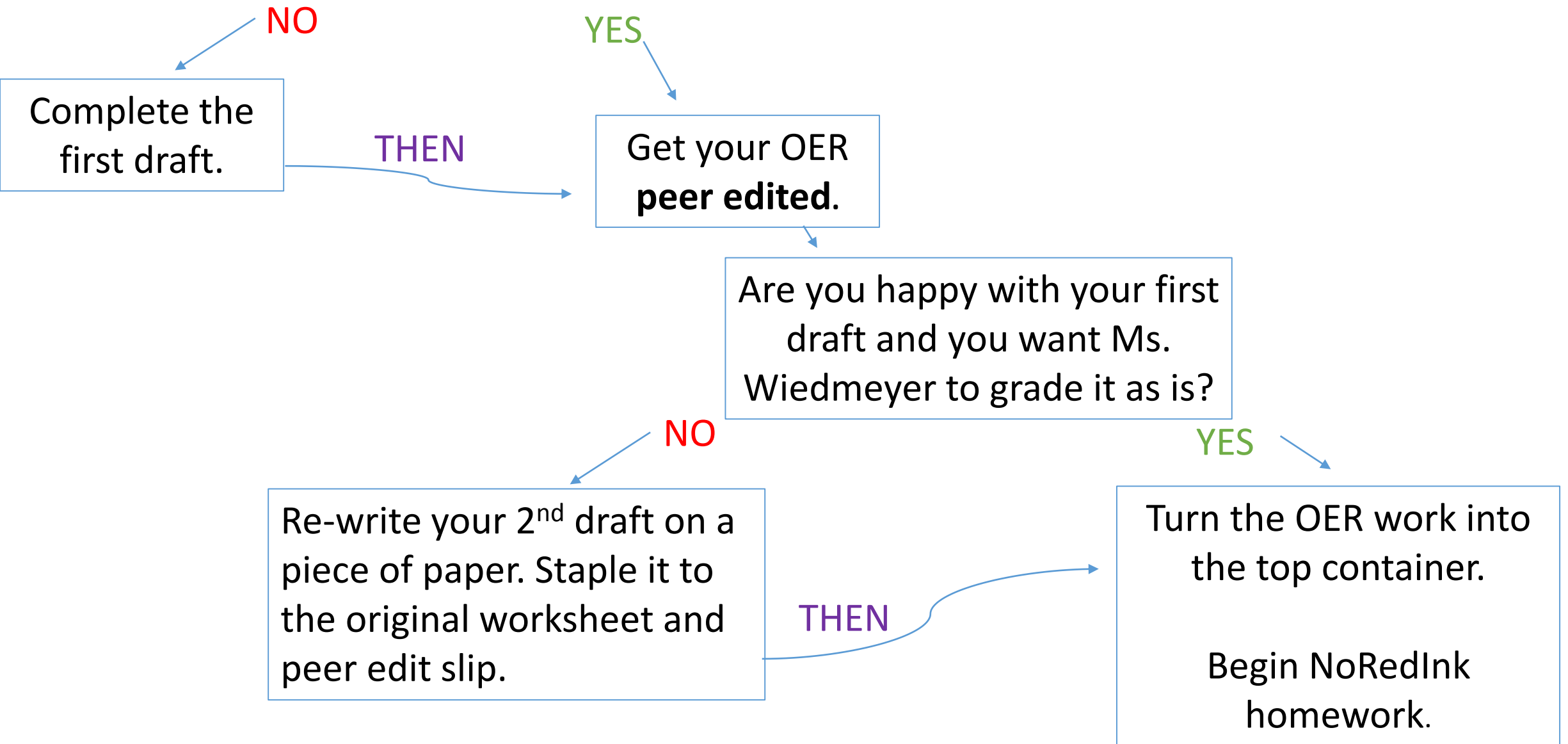
<b>SUCCESS! ☺</b>	<b>NEEDS WORK ☹</b>
<b>ANSWER:</b>	
Uses key words	Does NOT use key words
Contains the correct answer	Contains the wrong answer
<b>PROOF:</b>	
Quotations are used as evidence	No quotes used
Quote from article AND novel	Only 1 source used.
Quotations are introduced	Quotations are FLOPPED
Relevant proof is selected	Irrelevant proof is selected
Parenthetical reference is used correctly	NO parenthetical reference
<b>EXPLANATION</b>	
Does NOT just repeat the "Answer"	Repeats the "Answer" sentence
Explains how the proof show a change in the character (x3 pts)	Does not explain the importance of the proof selected. (x3 pts)

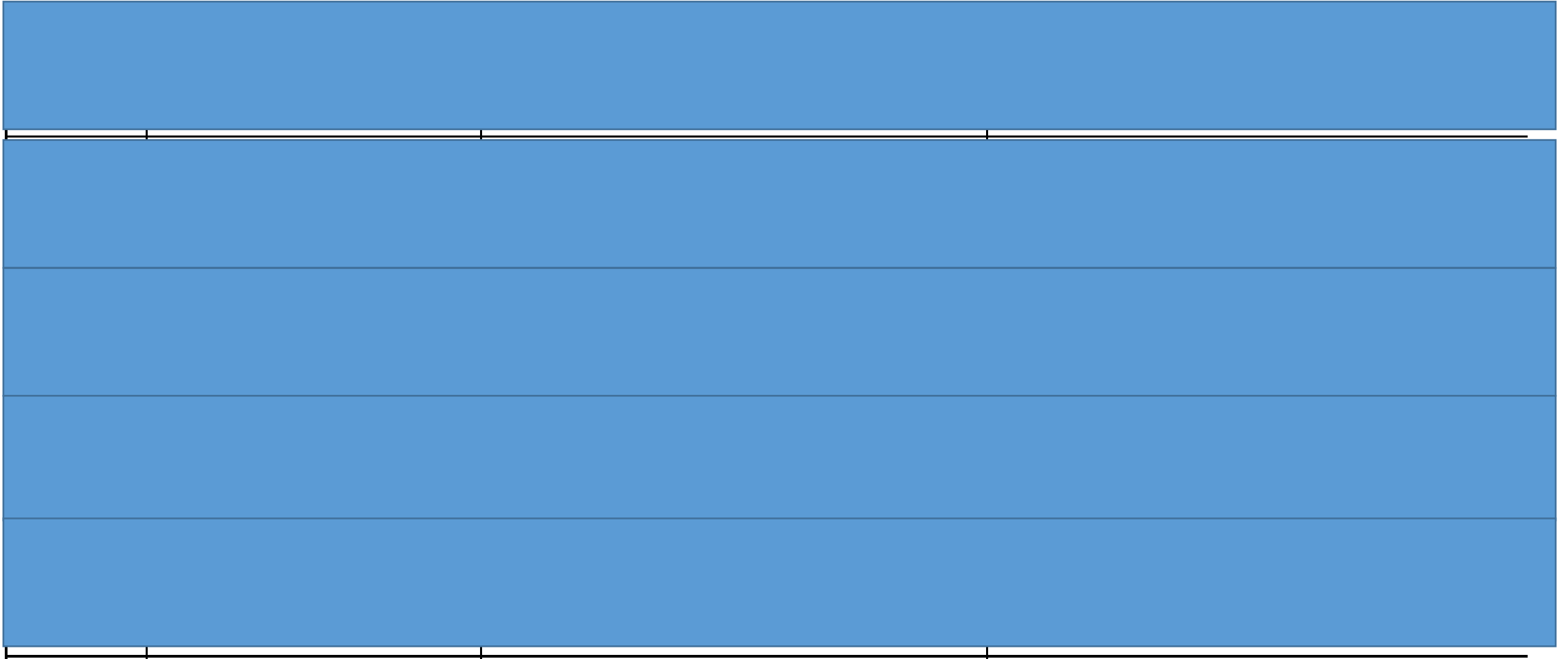
