# Parts of sentence

Sentences can be separated into basic parts:

- **Subject** (name) or **Topic** sentence is about
  - Contains **subject**
- **Predicate**: says something about the subject
  - Contains (and usually **verb** with) a **predicate**

	HINT	EXAMPLE
Step 1 → Find the verb.  Put a <span style="border: 1px solid black; padding: 2px;">box</span> around it.	<i>Look for a linking verb OR an action verb.</i>	Kanye West <span style="border: 1px solid black; padding: 2px;">needs</span> guidance.
Step 2 → Find the subject.  Put a <span style="border: 1px solid black; border-radius: 50%; padding: 2px;">circle</span> around it.	<i>Whom/what is doing the action? Or whom/what is the sentence about?</i>	Who needs? Kanye West <span style="border: 1px solid black; padding: 2px;">needs</span> guidance.
Step 3 → Read the sentence.  ASK: Can it stand by itself?	<i>Try adding "I think that..." before the phrase. If it makes sense, it IS a sentence!</i>	<i>I think that</i> Kanye West needs guidance.  <b>YES! It's a sentence.</b>
