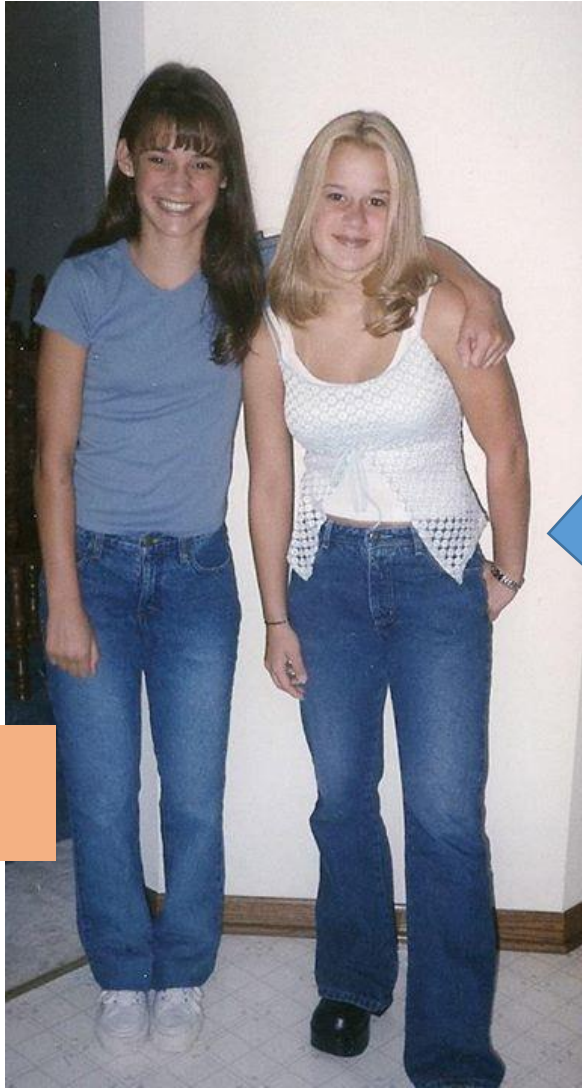

- I didn't want to, but my friends goaded me to steal the goat.



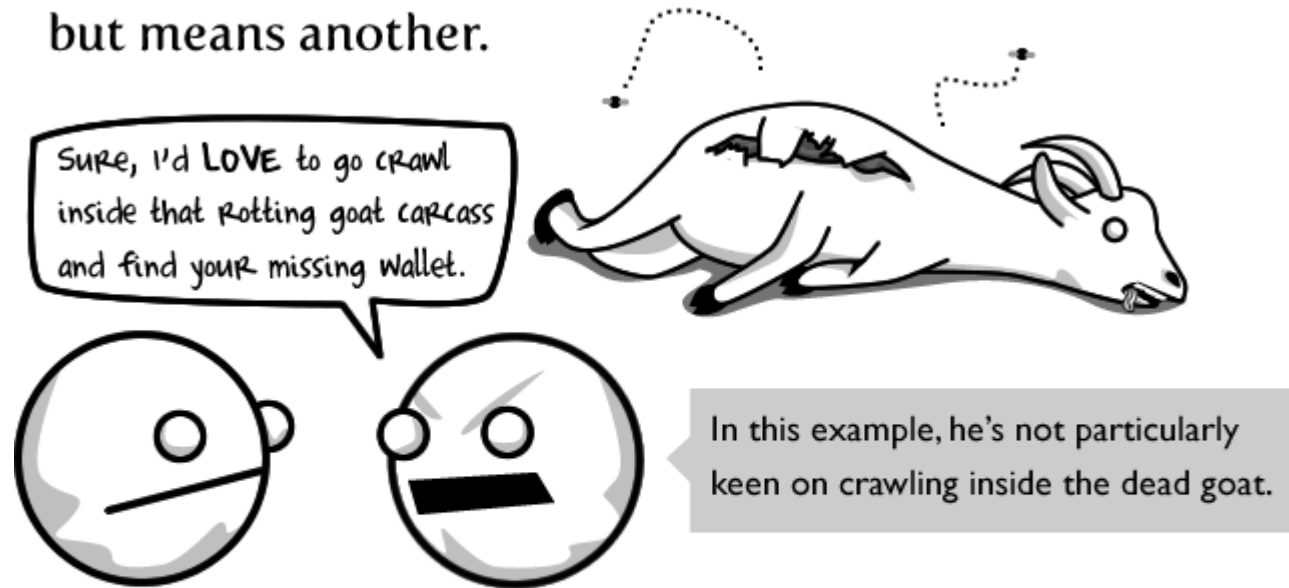
**Hottie**

**Verbal irony** is when a speaker says one thing but means another.



According to some literary experts, sarcasm is a form of verbal irony. According to others, it's not. The definition and usage of verbal irony is not important to remember; what *is* important to remember is that while these people are arguing back and forth about it, the rest of us are doing more interesting things like eating fried foods, stargazing, and riding jet-skis.

**Dramatic irony** is used in a narrative when an event occurs whose significance the audience understands but the characters do not.

For example, in *Romeo and Juliet* when the characters think that Juliet is dead but the audience knows she's only been knocked out by a sleeping potion.

# Situational Irony

Situational irony is when something happens and a reversal of expectations occurs.

The key is the **reversal**. For example:



**The reversal:** the armor, which was intended for protection, is what ended up causing harm.
