 - There will be times that you'll be able to use your phone in class. I will let you know. Other than that, they'll go in the pocket chart.




Welcome Work

 - Agree/Neutral/Disagree


Leaving for the bathroom:

The Six Word Memoir


- Once asked to write a full story in six words, legend has it that novelist Ernest Hemingway responded: "For Sale: baby shoes, never worn."
- The online magazine asked readers to write the story of their own lives in a single sentence. The result is Not Quite What I Was Planning, a collection of sixword memoirs by famous and not-so-famous writers, artists and musicians. Their stories are sometimes sad, often funny — and always concise.
- The book is full of well-known names from writer Dave Eggers (Fifteen years since last professional haircut), to singer Aimee Mann (Couldn't cope so I wrote songs), to comedian Stephen Colbert (Well, I thought it was funny).
- The collection has plenty of six-word insights from everyday folks as well: Love me or leave me alone was scrawled on a hand dryer in a public bathroom; I still make coffee for two was penned by a 27-year-old who had just been dumped.

What makes a good one?

It has to be something that tells a story.

 It has to be something that allows the reader to "infer" something about the writer.

Let's look at some examples...

How to write a 6 Word Memoir:

Step 1: Free write

Consider:

- · Milestones (important events)
- · Challenges you face daily
- Unforgettable memories
- Victories/losses that have shaped you
- Significant emotions
- · How you face adversity (what do you when something goes wrong)
- · Activities that are a major part of your identity


Step 2: Decision

From that list, pick one item that really shows an autobiographical side of you. That means, it should be specific to YOU (not "school is boring" but maybe, "I can't get better than C's in school"). Put that concept in the word bubble below.



\$tep 3: Brainstorm

Make your word bubble a spider diagram. On lines coming off of the word bubble, write down any words/ideas that you can relate to that concept. Think of synonyms, people, emotions, sounds, or any other words that somehow connect.



\$tep 4: Sentence

Write a sentence about your topic/theme. Don't worry about word count yet. Just make sure that it's about YOU and it has some sort of emotional quality to it.

\$tep 5: 6 Words

Here's where it gets tricky. Go back to Step 4 and think about which words you can take out. Can you think of one powerful word to use instead of a string of three weak ones? (Ex. "treated really badly" → "terrorized") Use a thesaurus to find **synonyms**. Write down all of your attempts on your "CLASS NOTES" page.


• Drafting... Pick the **best ONE** of the three you wrote and highlight, circle, or underline it.

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Step Two

- Get into partners. Desk fronts→ TOUCHING!
- Turn to your shoulder partners and introduce yourself.





Step Three

- On a post-it, write down your partner's name (check for spelling!)
 and ask him/her to share his/her memoir.
- Then, (on the same post-it) write down everything you can infer about that person based on his/her memoir.
 - It must be based on the text and you should think of at least three deeper level inferences.

Step Four

- Groups of 4
- In your group, please introduce your partner, have him/her read his/her memoir and then tell your group what you inferred about your partner based on the memoir.
- Take turns doing this until everyone has shared out.

Final Step: Sharing

 Take a minute to decide if you and your partner would like to share your memoirs with the class.

 At the very least, we will go around the room and introduce our partners and say one thing we learned about them from their memoirs. You will be writing a 6WM for HW, so if you want to copy it down on a post-it or paper, please do so.
